

LARDNER AND MOSS FAMILY

Lardner is an English name, derived from lardiner, meaning a bacon salter and sometimes an overseer of pigs. In Ireland Lardner belongs principally to County Galway where the Irish form of it is O Lorgnain. Families of Lardner unconnected with Galway or neighbouring counties are probably of English origin.

Some of the variations of the Lardner name are:

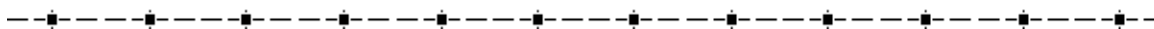

The research on this family has been gathered from various connections in England, Canada, the United States and Australia. The records used to prove the information are the Civil Registration Records for England 1837-1983.

David Beames of England was very helpful in looking up Parish records to prove this family, which dates back to the 1700s. Documentation has been proven with the certified copies of the birth, marriage and death records where available.

John Lardner of Charlbury, Oxford, England married Sarah Moss in the Parish of Merton, County of Surrey, England Aug 4, 1901. In 1907 they sailed from England and settled in Lumsden, Saskatchewan until they moved to Moosejaw, Saskatchewan in 1911.

Eli Lardner and **Mary Ann Moss** married 1 Dec 1856 in St. Mary Magdalene, Oxford, England. They had 9 children and John was the youngest.



The Origin of the Moss Name is of local origin from residence beside a moss or marsh.

Joseph Moss and Amy Julia Peacock married 23 Aug 1869 in Merton Parish, Wimbledon, Surrey, England. They had six children. Sarah was the fifth child born.

Joseph Moss and Ann Pratley who were married 1 June 1835 in Shipton Under Wychwood, Oxen, England were the parents of Mary Ann Moss and Joseph Moss. There were 8 children in this family.
