Our primary focus will be the ancestors and descendants of Francois Guedon & Marie Mollay's son, Pierre Guindon, born 24 Sep 1662, St. Pierre du Marche, Ville du Loudun, township Chaelleraut, diocese Poitiers, Poitou, France.

On the 21st of November 1706 Pierre married Catharine Rouchellet-Braza (widow of Vincellet) at the Notre Dame Church in Montreal, Quebec.

He died on the 26 of September 1733 at St. Francois Ile Jésus, Quebec.

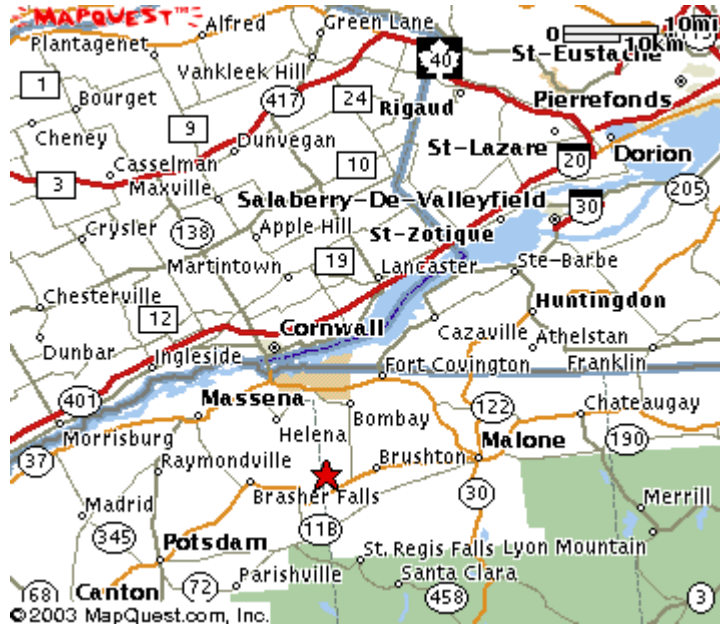
Laverne,

As far as a little history about the first Guindon to New York that I do have. Jean-Baptiste Guindon and Ursula Deguire-Larose are whom I am descendant from. They left Canada in 1838 at the time of the Papineau Rebellion. Ursula states at the time that they were living in St Benoit. Ursula states that the whole Village Church was burned by the British soldiers. And this unrest was the reason that they moved to Bombay, Franklin County, NY. She was not able to read or write so the spelling of her name was left to the people that were transcribing her testimony and they have her name spelled as Orsula Yandaw. As far as the names that you sent for me to look at, I can't say that I have connected any Yandoh's directly to my family as of yet. Although I know that they do somehow. I have, however, connected, Yeddo's and Yaddo, as well as Yandaw's and Yeddow.

This is the picture I am having trouble with. I do know the man in the picture. Everyone in the family states that he is Orton. The woman, however, is a mystery. That woman is NOT grandmother Rose. Orton's 2nd wife. I believe the girl standing *is* Rose but the rest of the family doesn't know for sure. But the resemblance between her and grandmother Rose is too striking to rule her out.

Who most of the children are is also a mystery. Except for the smallest girl on the woman's lap. My mother believes that to be Aunt Mary Yaddow. And if that is true then Mary was indeed Rose and Orton's first child and the picture would then fall into place. Orton was at least 20 years older than Rose.

Hope this makes sense. Let me know if you have any further questions. Rikki

There is info that I have from the 1875 Franklin County Town of Dickenson Census. Orton was on the list. I found Alexander (Benum) Yaddow 1828 married to Angeline Bebano and it shows 11 children. Orton 9-14-1857 or 1859? Showed 11 grandchildren. Dan, Emma, George, Mary, Jennie, Francis, Arthur, Irene, Alexander, Leonard, and Elizabeth. Orton had 2 wives- Delia Boyer and Rosa Snyder DOD about 1959. 209-522-2264- Francis Henry Yaddow-California # I found. He knows about this branch of the family. My grandfather was Harold Yaddow married to my grandmother-Phyllis Yaddow (living). I want to know everything I can find out so if you can help my address is 507 First Ave Extension, Frankfort, NY 13340. Please send me anything you have on the Yaddows if its printable and I will keep you posted. Thanks! The Yeddows and Yedaws must have come from Canada between 1850-1860. There was a Celia Yedaw age 55 listed. Ducat. Oliver Yedaw enlisted 8-9,1864 according to a Bicentennial history of Clinton and Franklin Counties

Rikk iMy Yaddow connection starts with Jean Baptiste Guindon my GGGG Grandfather b.1813 in Canada; he married Ursula Deguire Larose b.1813 Canada. They had six children, Moses b.1848, Vaingelou b.1843, Susanne b.1845, Nancy b.1853, John b.1850 and Oliver b.1837 my GGG Grandfather. The six children changed their name from Guindon to the English version, which is Yaddow. My GGG Grandfather Oliver Yaddow married Eliza Sousice and they had five children. Oliver died on 1/20/1865 at City Point Virginia where he was serving in the Civil war as a union soldier. I have a lot more info on this family so let me know if any of this sounds familiar

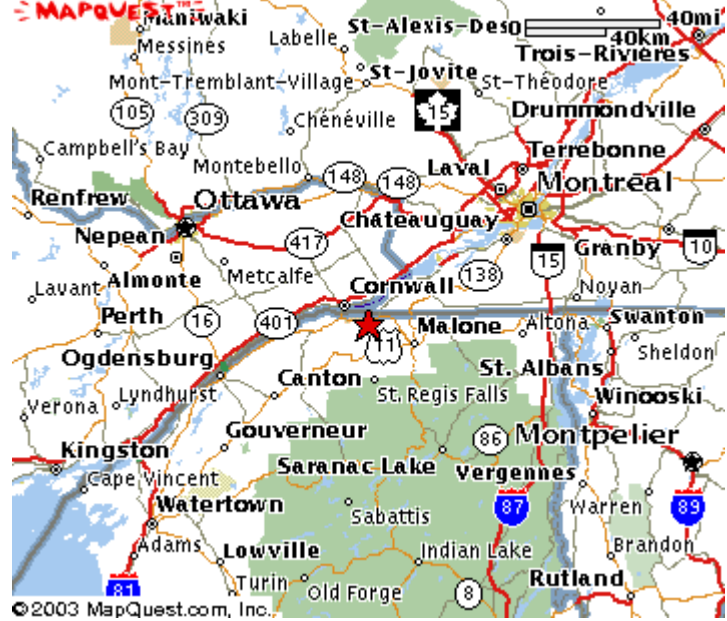

Marie Guindon (or Polly as she was called) was my g g grandmother. She married Thomas Boileau in 1828 in St. Benoit, Quebec. They came to the states in 1840 and the last name spelling changed to Barlow. Thomas Jr. b 1830 and m Malinda Russell in 1849. Mary b about 1833 and m Mose Russell when she was 13 and had 10 children. John b 1837 was unmarried and still living at home with Tom and Polly – at this time I am not sure what happened or where he went – these three children were born in Canada and John is listed as being naturalized in the 1865 census but can't find any record of it. Oliver b 1839 - was also known as Levi and was killed during the civil war Sophia b 1842. Eli b 1844 – he was also a civil war veteran and my g g grandfather and married Julia Russell and they had 10 children. Cornelia b 1845. Delia b 1848 and her married name appears to be River. Sophia and Cornelia appear in the 1850 census but not the 1860. According to affidavits filed in 1869 in Moira, NY county court both Delia and Ursula Guindon state that the two girls died young- probably from disease or disaster, as they apparently didn't make the journey from Lorraine, NY to Parishville, NY.
Levi and Eli enlisted in the B Company of the 92 NY Infantry Regiment on Oct 15 1861 in Potsdam NY. Shortly after enlisting Eli was hurt or wounded and developed fervor blister from it and was discharged and sent home to heal. When he was healthy he re-enlisted in the NY cavalry and was mustered out in Texas in 1864. He found his way back home to the family farm in Parishville, NY. Levi was shot and killed on March 13 1863 on a recon mission while stationed at Fort Anderson, NC – about two miles from New Bern.
Eli received two headstones from the government – one for each enlistment.

Francis Yandoh baptized L'Original, Ontario the son of Victoria Aubin and Jules Guindon
As you can see on the first line Mother's birthplace is listed as NY but at the bottom Victoria Yandoh (mother)
birthplace is **Canada**. It is important to verify your sources as mistakes are often made depending on who is giving the
information and when it is transcribed etc. Victoria is a widow.
*RE: L'Original – one of the first missions in Eastern Ontario. Priests would come from Montebello from across the river.
Vankleek Hill Catholic residents would travel to L'Original for sacrament & mass since the Parish of St. Gregoire of
Vankleek Hill was established in 1878. Father O'Malley served in L'Original between 1854 and 1861 which may account
for the misspelling of the name Guindon and their first name also.*

by a soldier in WW II. Laverne Aitchison - editor

My friend, Ann Belanger, who grew up in the Ottawa area shared this poem that was found in her families collection.

This poem was received by Mrs. W. L. Paul of Ottawa in a letter from her son after she had been advised by cable that he had died in an enemy air raid May 8th 1941.

An Airman's Vision - Somewhere in England, 1941

The sun sets in a haze of golden mist,
The sky above a glorious array
Of pink and red, of blue and amethyst,
A colorful farewell to a fleeting day.

An soon the stars from heav'n above look down,
On darkened town and cities here below.

DID YOU KNOW?

The term “the whole 9 yards” came from W.W.II fighter pilots in the Pacific. When arming their airplanes on the ground, the .50 caliber machine gun ammo belts measured exactly 27 feet before being loaded in the fuselage. If the pilots fired all their ammo at a target, it got “the whole 9 yards”.

The name Jeep came from the abbreviation used in the army for the “General Purpose” vehicle, GP, hence the JEEP.
