


## Our Goal



### **History of County of Deux-Montagnes**



The comté of Deux-Montagnes was created in 1830 with the division of the comté d'York into three parts: Ottawa, Vaudreuil and Deux-Montagnes. Deux-Montagnes is bordered in the east by the comté de Terrebonne, to the south by the Rivière des Outaouais and the Lac des Deux-Montagnes, to the west by the parishes of Saint-Benoît, Sainte-Scholastique and Saint-Colomban and finally to the north by the boundaries of the township of Gore. It included the parishes of Saint-Benoît, Sainte-Scholastique, Saint-Colomban, Saint-Augustin, Saint-Eustache, the mission of the Lac des Deux-Montagnes, part of the parish of Saint-Jérôme and also part of the Township de Morin. The comté was made up of three main seigneuries: seigneurie du Lac des Deux-Montagnes, seigneurie de la Rivière-du-Chêne, seigneurie de Blainville et d'Argenteuil and also the cantons de Gore, Chatham and Glengarry.....





# GUINDON CONNECTIONS

Back in 1992 I published a book called "Where Have All The Yandeau's Gone?" which covered the ancestry of two brothers **Leonard Yandeau** and **Thomas Yondau** as their **Guindon** family journeyed from Loudun, France to Quebec in the 1600's. *Yes, they both spelled their surnames differently even though they were brothers.* In the 1800's some Guindon families of Quebec settled in the Vankleek Hill, Ontario area. But, some of the Guindon families in Ontario crossed over the border into New York. This happened to the Quebec Guindon families who settled in the bordering states of Vermont, New York and Michigan to name a few. As I am always on the lookout for Guindon connections, one of my close genealogy friend's Irene Wright of Mesa, Arizona found a number of articles on the Guindon's in old newspapers in different areas of the United States. As I started to put together this edition of the Guindon newsletter I thought it would be interesting to piece together the following **Joseph Adolphe Guindon** family ancestry. **January 18, 1890 Bay City Times**, Bay City, Michigan page 7

**Adolph Guindon**, for being drunk, was before Justice Brigham this morning. His honor taxed him \$1 and costs, amount to \$6, which he paid. Blankets at 79 and 97 cents. A.J. Bothe & Co.

**Saturday April 1 1899 Bay City Times**, Bay City, Michigan page 5

**Joseph Guindon**, the well-known liquor dealer on Lafayette avenue, who has been ill several weeks past and had severe attack recently of la grippe, is in a very critical condition from all reports at Mt Clemens, where **Mrs. Guindon** has gone to the sanitarium at Mt. Clemens in response to a telegram sent her by request of **Mr. Guindon**. No news has been received for the past two days from Mt. Clemens, and it is hoped by the many friends of **Mr. Guindon** that he is recovering.

**Mrs. Adolphe Guindon**, aged 72 years, an old resident of Bay City, passed away yesterday afternoon. **Mrs. Guindon** was born in Ste. Therese, Province of Quebec, Canada, in 1837 and had lived in Bay county since 1866. She was the mother of five children. The survivors are: **Joseph Guindon**, **Isaac Guindon** and **Mrs. Joseph Turgeon**, **Wilfred Guindon** and **Mrs. I. Obey**, having preceded the deceased by a few years. The aggregate number of descendants is 52, as follow: Children, 5; grand children, 42; great grand children, 5. The funeral will take place Thursday from the residence, 1313 Washington avenue, at 9 a.m. Solemn high mass will be held in St. Joseph church at 9:30 a.m.

The Bar, Larder and Stable, shall be well supplied and attended, and every personal attention given, which want or case may require. A good house for carriages will always be ready for their reception. N. G. is grateful for past favors, and by cheerful attention, wishes to retain the public confidence and patronage.

### **FATAL STEAMBOAT EXPLOSION AT PUGET SOUND-SIX LIVES LOST.-**

**A dispatch dated Olympia, August 20th says:**

The steamer Resolute, **Capt. Guindon**, owned by Meigs & Gawley of the Port Madison mill, exploded her boiler at 9 o'clock on the night of August 19th, while towing a raft near North Bay. Capt. Guindon and Nicholas Janeowich, deck hand, were the only survivors. **Capt. Guindon** had one leg broken and face and hands considerably scalded. He was conveyed to this place for medical treatment, and is reported out of danger. Six lives lost-either ruled or drowned. The names are as follows: Leonard Greenlaw and Capt. W. H. Perkins, passengers (the latter formerly of Walla Walla;) Joseph Shannon, engineer; Andrew Smith and Barney Dagnon, firemen, and a Chinaman cook. The boat is a total loss, sinking immediately after the explosion. The cause of the disaster is unknown.

**Friday, December 1884, Saginaw News**, Saginaw, Michigan page 2

**Wilfred F. Guindon** was arraigned in Justice Forrest's court this morning on complaint of C. Exem Brown, who claims that **Guindon** endeavored to extort money from him by making threats. The complaint contains a copy of a letter which Brown says was sent him by Brown and that unless he (**Guindon**) receives \$10 from Brown he would cause the latter to be arrested for perjury. **Guindon** pleaded not guilty to the charge and the case was adjourned until next Wednesday at 9 a.m.

**Friday Feb 24 1899 Bay City Times**, Bay City, Michigan Page 6

The remains of the late **W. F. Guindon**, of Washington, who died suddenly on Monday, will take place from the residence of his brother, **Joseph Guindon**, 619 Lafayette Avenue, Monday morning at 8:30 and at 9 o'clock from St. Joseph church. The deceased lived here for 18 years, and was appointed to a position as watchman at the Untied States capitol. He is survived by a widow and seven children.

# A LITTLE TRIVIA

1. **WHY?** Why do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left?

**BECAUSE:** When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.

2. **WHY?** Why do ships and aircraft use 'mayday' as their call for help?

**BECAUSE:** This comes from the French word m'aidez - meaning 'help me' - and is pronounced, approximately, 'mayday.'

3. **WHY?** Why are zero scores in tennis called 'love'?

**BECAUSE:** In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it 'love.'

4. **WHY?** Why do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses?

**BECAUSE:** In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

5. **WHY?** Why is shifting responsibility to someone else called 'passing the buck'?

**BECAUSE:** In card games, it was once customary to pass an item, called a buck, from player to player to indicate whose turn it was to deal. If a player did not wish to assume the responsibility of dealing, he would 'pass the buck' to the next player.

6. **WHY?** Why do people clink their glasses before drinking a toast?

**BECAUSE:** In earlier times it used to be common for someone to try to kill an enemy by offering him a poisoned drink. To prove to a guest that a drink was safe, it became customary for a guest to pour a small amount of his drink into the glass of the host. Both men would drink it simultaneously. When a guest trusted his host, he would only touch or clink the host's glass with his own.

7. **WHY?** Why are people in the public eye said to be 'in the limelight'?

**BECAUSE:** Invented in 1825, limelight was used in lighthouses and theatres by burning a cylinder of lime which produced a brilliant light. In the theatre, a performer 'in the limelight' was the centre of attention.

8. **WHY?** Why is someone who is feeling great 'on cloud nine'?

**BECAUSE:** Types of clouds are numbered according to the altitudes they attain, with nine being the highest cloud. If someone is said to be on cloud nine, that person is floating well above worldly cares.

9. **WHY?** In golf, where did the term 'Caddie' come from?

**BECAUSE:** When Mary Queen of Scots went to France as a young girl, Louis, King of France, learned that she loved the Scots game 'golf.' He had the first course outside of Scotland built for her enjoyment. To make sure she was properly chaperoned (and guarded) while she played, Louis hired cadets from a military school to accompany her. Mary liked this a lot and when she returned to Scotland (not a very good idea in the long run), she took the practice with her. In French, the word cadet is pronounced 'ca-day' and the Scots changed it into caddie.

10. **WHY?** Why are many coin collection jar banks shaped like pigs?

**BECAUSE:** Long ago, dishes and cookware in Europe were made of dense orange clay called 'pygg'.

When people saved coins in jars made of this clay, the jars became known as 'pygg banks.'

When an English potter misunderstood the word, he made a container that resembled a pig. And it caught on.....
